The Learning Environment

- Work with your family to determine where your online learning will take place.
- Consider and balance your needs as a learner with your families needs.
- If other people are at home, ask for respect and be respectful.

Everyone needs an environment that supports their best work.

• Let your advisor know if you and/or your family have any concerns for your learning environment at home.

Behavior and Appearance

- AFS expectations of behavior and appearance still apply in this new learning environment.
- Show up everyday. Your advisor will take attendance every morning.
- When you are on camera for a Zoom session, dress the same as you would for school.
- Always uphold the AFS expectations for online behavior and academic integrity.
- **Respect everyone's privacy!** Never take or post images/video of your classmates or teachers.
- Social media is for social use this is school :) Never post about our AFS experience without permission.

Useful Tips

- Check and read your **email** every day! Respond to teachers and classmates promptly.
- Check **Google Classroom**! Complete your assignments and turn them in on time.
- Mute your microphone when you are not speaking during Zoom sessions.
- Be a self-starter. It takes discipline to work independently, so use your time wisely.
- Communicate your needs and ask questions.

Discussion Boards and Chats

• Online discussions for a class.

Use an academic tone in your posts to chats and discussion boards.

Don't use slang, abbreviations, or emojis that you would use texting or chatting with friends, unless it's part of the assignment.

- **Give a title to your post** that has a keyword related to the topic.
- Stick to *one* point in your post, supported by evidence. Be concise. Long online posts are difficult to read.
- Be specific!

Include a page number or a small part of the passage.

- Do your best to contribute!
 - **Say more** than "I agree" to move the discussion forward.
 - $\circ~\mbox{Respond}$ to a classmate's post.
 - Give **positive feedback** to your classmates to create a positive environment.
 - You can agree *and* disagree with a classmate. Always provide evidence to support your perspective or question that of another.
 - Avoid comments that can be hurtful or cause offense. Saying, "No offense, but.." does not make it okay.
- **Contribute with real world application** of a concept that will deepen your discussions.
- Feel free to change your mind! Your post is not your thoughts forever. Your views will change based on *Continuing Revelation.*
